The purpose is not mockery or sensationalism, but protection. Scripture commands believers to test the spirits, not to assume that power, beauty, or emotional impact indicate divine origin. By grounding discernment in objective biblical criteria rather than subjective experience, this work equips readers to recognize counterfeit light and remain anchored in truth, humility, and obedience.
